experienced trauma and
hardship is truly
inspiring, and we are
grateful for all that you
do.

In President Biden's recent proclamation on foster care month, he announced several initiatives his administration is taking to support foster care. Some initiative examples include making the adoption tax credit fully refundable, proposing extending the credit to legal guardians, removing barriers that make it harder for LGBTQI+ families to foster and adopt, expanding the Military Parental Leave Program to new foster placements, and a \$9 billion

budget to provide housing vouchers to all 20,000 youth exiting foster care annually. To thank foster parents from across the state, there are efforts to celebrate foster parents in more areas than ever before; there's Elko's Caregiver Day on 5/20, a planned Carson City caregiver Picnic in August, Bowling for Nye county and other gifts and neat acts of service provided by supporters of your community. NATIONAL FOSTER CARE MONTH 2023 CHILDREN'S BUREAU MESSAGE

This year, the Children's Bureau collaborated with parents, guardians, and young people with lived experience to develop its focus for the month. What we heard was that children and youth in foster care, and their caregivers, need us to focus on their mental well-being as diligently as we focus on their physical health and safety. This month, let us take a holistic and culturally responsive approach to embody this year's theme,

"Strengthening Minds, Uplifting Families."

They said the approach should be, trauma informed, individualized, and culturally responsive. An approach that is trauma informed and individualized will consider that each child in a single family may be impacted differently and any plan will be person-centered.

Culturally responsive could mean treatment plans that include traditional, and non-Westernized traditional practices. Using a lens of compassion and cultural humility to understand the ways that culture can impact how a person approaches mental health is vital to being able to connect children, youth, and families to the services they need.

We have a unique opportunity to be the added support when more is needed. I encourage you to explore the resources and stories within, regarding what we can do to further strengthen families, on the National Foster Care Month website.

TIPS TO 1. Nurture youth's well-being early, often, and continuously. Don't wait for the signs. Strengthen 2. Talk about mental health as needs and strengths rather than problems or issues. **Minds & Uplift** 3. Recognize what culture has to offer. Incorporate traditions, practices, and community. **Families** 4. Engage youth. Ask what types of supports they needincluding traditional and nontraditional options. 5. 
