Greetings HSA Community,

Human Services Agency is excited to announce our upcoming launch of PRIME. PRIME is a child centered, web-based program and uses innovative technology aimed at elevating the quality of life for youth in the foster care system. It also increases caregiver engagement through streamlined communication with the youth's team.

PRIME was born out of a desire to decrease placement disruptions by finding the *best home*, not just the first home that can be matched for youth. PRIME considers hundreds of data points when matching a youth with a home.

The use of PRIME will only be as useful as the information that is entered into the system. This is why WCHSA will depend on WCHSA staff and resource parents to utilize the program to it's full capability for timely communication, such as real time updates or access to a youth's medical history and upcoming appointments, a messaging platform for team members, and a simplified application and renewal process for resource parents.

PRIME will go live starting in February 2020. A targeted training plan, including in-person and online trainings, will be implemented. You will be notified when you are selected to participate in training and start using the program. As you can imagine the training process will take some time to roll out to all users.

We are very inspired by PRIME and how it will revolutionize case practice, team communication, and outcomes for our families.

Licensing has now transitioned to issuing biennial licenses!

What does this mean for you?



It means that your license is valid for **2 years** - although you'll still see our smiling faces yearly.

Each year you will still have to meet annual requirements, such as, but not limited to the inspection, Child Abuse and Neglect check, background checks as needed, complete your required trainings, service your fire extinguisher, complete your fire drill log, and review/complete your emergency disaster plan.

On your non-renewal year, you will not need to complete any of the paperwork (the relicensing letter, children in the home form, relicensing survey, and questionnaire) and you will not be issued a new license.

Reach out to your licensing worker if you have any questions!

A couple of reminders...

Workers need to attend specialist appointments and surgeries of our kiddos.

Please make sure to give ample notice as soon as any of these appointments are scheduled so they can arrange their schedule to attend!



Our office will be closed Monday, February 17th for President's Day. If you have a visit scheduled, please touch base with your worker to get it rescheduled or to figure out alternative arrangements!

Families that have WIC, MED or NVCheckUp qualify for a brand new car seat and installation for a \$10 fee through Renown Health.

Families that don't qualify bring in their own car seat & pay a \$25 fee & any additional installation or inspection is \$10.

Foster Families fall in the \$10 service fee per car seat. Just take a copy of your placement letter which includes the child's Medicaid number.

The car seat should follow the child that received it. If the foster family gets another child they can come and get another one for that other child.

They will also check to make sure that the car seats that are being used / borrowed are not expired.

We know that finding the right car seat and installing it correctly is no easy task. Then there's the question of when to transition your child to another type of car seat.

Car seats and boosters protect infants and children in a crash, yet car crashes are a leading cause of death for children ages 1 to 13. Select a car seat based on your child's age, size, a car seat that fits in your vehicle and use it every time.

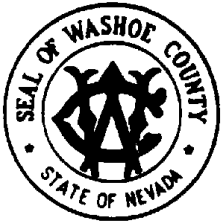

Safe Babies Court (SBCT) CASES

What it is:

Safe Babies Court cases are much like other cases. There is an assigned case worker, Deputy District Attorney, parent's legal counsel and children's legal counsel. The team works to identify and provide services for families with infants and toddlers. For a case to be in SBCT, there just has to be one child in the family who is age 3 or under.

Community Coordinator:

Each SBCT case also has a Community Coordinator. That person works to keep the case moving forward with multiple team meetings, locating services for families and helping support the case plan. The Community Coordinator does not make case decisions such as changes to visits, when children go home and the permanency plan of the case.

SBCT Goals:

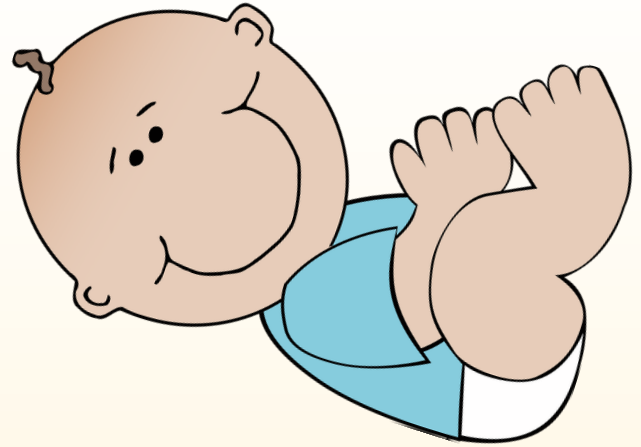
- ◆ Establish frequent and quality family contact
 - ◇ Contact occurs in the home or family friendly locations
- ◆ Substitute care families will co-parent with the biological parents
- ◆ Parent participation in a reading program called 2 for 2
 - ◇ Biological parent will call the child and substitute care family to read a book over the phone (books will be provided and geared towards the child's developmental level)
- ◆ The more frequent the contact the better!
 - ◇ Not just scheduled family time, but also Facetime, Skype, phone calls and routine things like medical/dental appointments



Safe Babies Court (SBCT) CASES Cont.

How it works:

- ◆ SBCT families have court hearings every 2 months (instead of about every 3-4 months) to review their progress.
- ◆ SBCT families have Family Team Meetings every other month to help keep everyone on track.
 - ◇ These FTM's are held during months when no court hearing is scheduled.
- ◆ SBCT families are typically assessed for participation in special family therapy sessions (CPP), once a week.
 - ◇ The goal of this therapy is to work on attachment and trauma issues.
This is a key component of SBCT.
- ◆ Most of these cases also have children's service providers who attend Court and/or team meetings
 - ◇ Such as NEIS, Early Head Start or other specialized services.

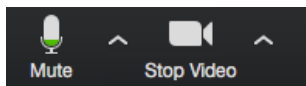
Video Conferencing is coming to Team Meetings!

HSA is happy to announce that we will be using ZOOM for *some** facilitated team meetings so that you, our busy foster parents, can join meetings from anywhere using a smartphone, tablet, laptop, or computer. It's the next best thing to you being here in person! Using Zoom is simple:

1. Download the Zoom app if you plan to use a phone or tablet/ipad for zoom meetings.
2. An invitation that details the date, time, and meeting ID link to join will be sent to you by the meeting organizer. ** Ask the meeting organizer if zoom attendance is available for your meeting if it isn't discussed at the time of scheduling.*
3. Join the meeting: A minute or two before the start of the meeting, open the invitation and click on the meeting ID to join the meeting. If you are using a laptop or computer, you can do the same or go to <https://zoom.us/> then click join a meeting and enter the meeting ID. If your computer does not have a microphone you will also need to call in to join the audio.

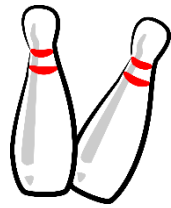

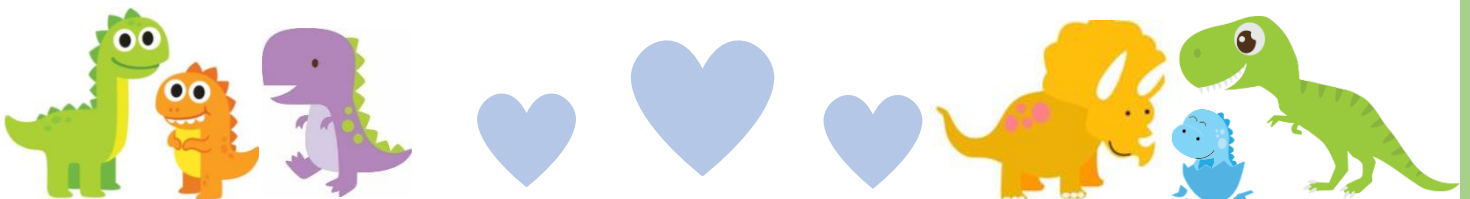
