If you have questions or need any type of support don't hesitate to call, text or email Kylee Spring & your licensing worker.



If ANY household members exhibit any symptoms of COVID-19, even if mild, OR if they have been exposed to a COVID-19 positive person, OR if anyone in the household tests positive for COVID-19, that they must:

- 1. Contact the health department or their medical provider for guidance on testing.
- 2. Immediately self-isolate the household until medically cleared. This includes any in-person contact including visitation, meetings, appointments etc.
- 3. Notify the child(ren)'s caseworker(s) and the licensing worker within the same business day.

Below are amazing new trainings that are on the QPI website. You can receive renewal training hours for these trainings!

LifeBook Training

Foster children need a sense of value and a way to maintain connections while in foster care. Lifebook's document a child's journey through foster care. This training helps to define what a Lifebook is for foster children. It discusses the importance of a Lifebook. The training teaches participants options for pages to work on with the child. It reviews the parameters and expectations of a Lifebook. Lifebook's can prepare a child for reunification and/or adoption. The training helps to engage a child with the book. (1 hour)

Affirming Care of LBGTQIA+ Youth (cc)

In this presentation you will learn about child development and gender and orientation. LGBTQ+ youth are over-represented in the child welfare system, and this presentation explains that affirmation can be life changing for youth. You will learn about the psychological evaluation process, puberty blockers and hormone therapies, and the importance of seeking help from affirming professionals. (0.5 hour)

Understanding & Supporting Children with Oppositional Defiant Disorder

Is your child angry and irritable? Vindictive? Defiant? Our presenters explain the criteria for an ODD diagnosis, and several parenting strategies you can use to help with these behaviors. (0.25 hour)

Regulation for Preservation

This brief training defines dysregulation and provides examples of what dysregulation could look like for some children. The training also touches on brain functioning and the differences between "old brain" and "new brain" responses to dysregulation. Techniques on how to identify dysregulation for children and how to help children identify their own dysregulation, as well as techniques on how to encourage regulation when a child is triggered are also discussed. (0.25 hour)

Managing Children's Emotions & Behaviors

Connections and relationships are foundational to help children manage their emotions and behavior. Our presenters offer several techniques to connect with children and build relationships that will sustain challenges. (0.25 hour)

Transitioning for Success

Whether big or small transitions, it is important to understand how to help our children. Our presenters give helpful techniques to use to honor our children and help them develop the skills they need to successfully manage transitions. (0.25 hour)



Re-Engagement Intervention Program – Things to know!

What is the program all about?

- Locating youth who have vanished from school
- Identifying barriers to attendance and provide case management through resource referrals, mentoring and advocacy
- Increasing student engagement
- Enrolling students back into a school setting within 45 days of intake date
- Improving the 'stick rate' of students to be defined as those students who work with Reengagement to get enrolled and ensure they will then be enrolled the next year
- Accessing academic needs and determine an appropriate education setting
- Increasing attendance rates for enrolled students

COVID-19 Vaccination Points of Distribution

- In partnership with the Washoe County Health District (WCHD), the Washoe County School District (WCSD) is hosting COVID-19 Vaccination Points of Distribution (PODs) for the community at school sites, free of charge, to anyone 12 years or older who has not received the vaccine.
- In addition to vaccine clinics during school hours for students, members of the community may receive vaccines at the school sites later in the day, after students have been dismissed from classes. At the community clinics, the Health District is offering all three types of available vaccines: Johnson & Johnson, Moderna, and Pfizer, along with boosters for Johnson & Johnson, Moderna, and Pfizer. Mix and match boosters are only available for Johnson & Johnson at this time.

Students in foster care are entitled to similar rights as students classified as Children In Transition, but foster is not considered a homeless situation and foster students are not CIT eligible. FAQ – Educational Quick Facts re. Youth in Foster Care

INCLUDING important WCHSA policy updates!!
(Updated 9/30/21)

Did you know??

- SCHOOL OF ATTENDANCE: Foster youth have the right to remain at their School of Origin (see definition at end
 of document) when they come into care and/or change placements even if it's an adoptive placement to
 reduce additional disruptions and maintain their educational stability.
 - o WHY?
 - Often the school they attend when they come into care is the "only" stable environment in their world – while parents and placements are in flux.
 - Statistically, foster youth lose an average of 6 months of education for every school move/disruption
 - WCHSA is bound by State and National legislation, to ensure that every effort is made to maintain our foster youth in their School of Origin.
 - IF it is determined to be in the best interest of the student to change schools, it MUST be
 approved by WCHSA leadership. This process is coordinated through the student's worker and
 the WCHSA educational liaison.
 - Foster Parents, relatives and fictive kid CANNOT change a youth's school without proper approval through WCHSA.
- TRANSPORTATION: Mileage reimbursement is available to whomever is assisting with transportation if there is
 no bus available. This applies to "anyone" transporting the youth, while the case is open.
 - The district tracks the miles, so you don't have to! The reimbursement is one round trip, based on mapped miles between school and placement address and is disbursed once a month (electronic payments are available!) for the prior month of transport.
- STRONG COMMUNICATION IS KEY
 - The relationship with your student's school is your first line of defense in providing support.
 - Communicate with your worker when things get confusing or challenging.

- INFINITE CAMPUS: Get acquainted with Infinite Campus to follow student progress provide kudos earned and track missing assignments. "It takes a village" and caregivers are an essential part of that village!

Something new with Specialized Foster Care

After some time in the making, a significant change is coming to Specialized Foster Care (SFC)! The State of Nevada (Division of Child and Family Services and Medicaid) worked with the Medicaid at the federal level to get a state plan amendment for SFC to provide additional services to help children with behavioral/mental health issues. Under a 1915i Home and Community Based Services application, children placed in Specialized Foster Care can now be supported with <u>Crisis Stabilization Services</u> and <u>Intensive In-Home Supports and Services</u>. So what does this mean?

Children in SFC, and the families with whom they live, that have difficulties at home can receive services to help stabilize the child and family. Crisis Stabilization Services can include psychoeducation, crisis stabilization, and crisis resolution support.

Additionally, children in SFC who have identified service needs can be provided Intensive In-Home Supports and Services. These services are delivered based on a plan of care and through Coaching resource parents using Together Facing the Challenge (a.k.a., "TFTC"). With this service, evidence-based interventions that target emotional, cognitive and behavioral functioning within a variety of actual and/or simulated social settings can be targeted.

These services focus on enabling children to attain or maintain his or her maximum potential, the goal to achieve community stabilization, prevention disruption, and maintain health and safety. WCHSA is grateful for the addition of these services to help improve the overall well-being of children placed in Specialized Foster Care.

Stuff A Bus: occurring Nov. 5 from 2-6 at Target. FEC will be handing out winter clothing beginning the week of November 8. More to come.





Holiday With A Hero: This program is back on after COVID cancelled it last year. For 60 lucky kiddos currently being served by WCHSA, they will receive a \$100 gift card to Target and will shop with a 'Hero' from the Sparks Fire Dept or Sparks Police Dept. Caseworkers will nominate kiddos who they think will benefit the most. Care Providers are encouraged to help their caseworkers with nominations. The event will occur Dec. 8.

Holiday Meal Help: many local organizations are donating food or meal kits for Holiday dinners. If you or someone you know are in desperate need of assistance, contact your caseworker/licensing worker, along with the FEC to see what is available.





Reunification Bags: to reward families for their tremendous work towards reunification, gifts are presented at transition meetings through a grant for Fostering Relationships. Supplies and games are provided to the birth family in addition to the care provider.

Fostering Relationship Events: an email will be out soon regarding this program. Throughout late November and December, families (foster, birth, and child) will have events to choose from to enjoy together, while co-parenting. You will get to choose from Ice Skating, Coconut Bowl/Wild Island, and Galaxy Movies in Sparks. Once the email and RSVP form comes out, get it returned quickly to secure your spot.





Books for foster care: FEC has many books available to families who want some resources for children struggling with feelings of abandonment, trauma, and reunification. Come by the FEC to grab one.

Pennington Grant: 7 more shopping days are scheduled to allow all care providers to come shop for Christmas Gifts for kiddos in care. Emails have been sent out. Call the FEC 352-3230 to reserve your time/day for shopping. Ask for Ashley or Rhonda. As a reminder – kiddos should not be present for these shopping days as we encourage the gifts to be surprises.

CHRISTMAS IS COMING!

Season's Greetings Care Providers, Resource Families, Caseworkers, and others!



HO HO! Here we are again - the Holidays are coming fast. For those not aware, the Pennington Foundation has graciously gifted foster children in WCHSA custody an unbelievably large grant for 2021 that encompasses Supplies, Clothing, and Christmas Gifts. So far, all children have been provided access to SUPPLIES (school/educational or diapering), CLOTHING (at one of several shopping days held in Sept/Oct) and now we are ready for the final (and most exciting) portion of the grant... CHRISTMAS PRESENT shopping days! As with supplies and clothing, the Christmas portion of the grant is only available to children in WCHSA custody who reside in Northern Nevada. To sign-up for and attend a shopping day, please **open the attachment**, **complete it and send it back to hsa-penningtonproject@washoecounty.gov.**

Important things to note:

- 1. Within 3 business days of sending in your RSVP you should receive a response that your request was received and you are RSVP'd for your preferred date and time. Please call the FEC (775-352-3230) and ask for Ashley if you need to follow up on your request or if you do not receive a confirmation email.
- 2. You <u>must check-in at the table</u> located inside the store to obtain your 'shopping pass' any time after 12 noon to ensure you are ready to check-out at your identified time (the time you sign up for).
- 3. WCHSA staff will be present at each event to assist you. You must be in the check-out line by 4:00 pm or you will need to come back another day.
- 4. When done shopping, you will move to one of 2 check stands with WCHSA staff who will purchase your items.
- 5. Children should not be in attendance at these events Christmas gifts should be surprises.
- 6. We are only allowing one shopping day per child so all the items you choose will need to be made at that one store on that scheduled day.
- 7. For those that want to send pics or thank you letters to the Pennington Foundation, please email those to hsa-penningtonproject@washoecounty.gov.

Family Engagement Center (FEC) Resource

Accessing new clothing, diapers, shoes, etc. for kiddos coming into care is difficult for most resource families to do at the 'drop of a hat'. I am happy to announce that with 'leftover' monies from our 2020 Pennington Foundation grant, the FEC was able to purchase a large amount of new clothing items and diapers for kiddos. At this time, however, the items purchased are ONLY for NEW kids coming into care. If you receive a new placement, give the FEC a call (775-352-3230) or stop by (905 E. Prater Way in Sparks) to gather a few of the following items for kiddos 0-18:

- Diapers/wipes (including pull-ups, goodnites, etc.)
- Shoes
- Socks
- Underwear
- Pajamas Shorts and T-shirts.
- Bathing suits
- Hygiene items
- Etc.

In addition, for any foster home that has African American children, we have a large **supply of ethnic hair care products** just for them.


