- a board game/activity for your family,

- a book "The Invisible String" that we ask you to read with your foster child and send with them
 when they go home,

 That book can either stay with you or be sent back home with the child,
- an activity just for you and your family,
- a picture frame kit which is intended to be done with you and your foster child. Please make a

If ANY household members exhibit any symptoms of COVID-19, even if mild, OR if they have been exposed to a COVID-19 positive person, OR if anyone in the household tests positive for COVID-19, that they must:

- 1. Contact the health department or their medical provider for guidance on testing.
- 2. Immediately self-isolate the household until medically cleared. This includes any in-person contact including visitation, meetings, appointments etc.
- 3. Notify the child(ren)'s caseworker(s) and the licensing worker within the same business day.

Understanding the LGBTQ+ Community and Supporting the Foster Youth in Your Care

Understanding the LGBTQ+ Community and Supporting the Foster Youth in Your Care Training objectives are: improve basic knowledge of the LGBTQ+ community including terminology, how to support youth through the coming out process, increasing understanding of gender identity and gender non-conforming youth to respond appropriately, and building awareness of issues the LGBTQ+ community may face (0.75 hour)

Tools for Maintaining African American Hair

This training addresses questions many foster parents have about caring for ethnic hair types. The training interviews two barbers on hair care routines, needs, and how to maintain the hair of foster youth. Many foster parents have questions and want to hear it from the experts. (0.5 hour)

Providing Support to Youth Who Have Experienced Toxic Stress

This video provides an overview of adverse childhood experiences and toxic stress, how toxic stress shows up in behavior and beliefs, as well as how to support youth who

have experienced or are experiencing toxic stress. Presented by licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, Barbara Lankamp-Kochis. (0.5 hour)

Creating Permanency for Youth

Youth transitioning out of foster care often come out at a disadvantage. The norm they had grown accustom to where supportive adults fulfill specific needs typically comes to an end when they leave foster care. However, that's when they actually need more supportive people and this training addresses the need. This training is designed to help caretakers have the conversations needed to discover the supports youth will have when they leave care. (1.5

Child Centered Strategies for Supporting Families

Children from hard places manifest the trauma they have experienced in many different ways. Caregivers report the child in their care acting out in ways such as running away, lying, stealing, and arguing but also with children who shut down, become isolated, and stop communicating. Despite the services and trainings available to support families, caregivers often report they continue to feel unprepared and not provided with adequate tools to support children who display significant intensity of behaviors in their home display. This panel will provide a brief overview of recent media events highlighting caregiver's responses to the behaviors of the children in their homes and engage participants in a discussion in approaches to assist in the moment. The panel will be interactive, providing a significant question and answer segment as well (1.5 hour)



Independent Living Information



Resource families are critical to helping youth gain both necessary independent living skills as well as necessary relationships that can support young people into adulthood. Utilizing a permanency pact is a great tool to frame a discussion between a young person and their identified support system. This pact formalizes the commitment of an adult in a youth's world and how they can show up to be a support for them.


Taking a step toward trusting a relationship is often a very great accomplishment for a youth with a background where relationships are broken, promises

are often not kept, and disappointment in caretakers prevails. The gift that a Supportive Adult contributes by way of a life-long

commitment to the relationship is heroic. The impact of the forged relationship may be profound to all parties.

How can you help? As one of the most important people in a young person's life, you can offer to help facilitate a conversation between your young person and the adults they identify as supportive connections. Offering to review and sign the permanency pact can help solidify the commitment those supportive adults are making to that young person.

My name is Jennifer Jopling and I'm the Director of Programs & Development for <u>UMPS CARE Charities</u>, the official philanthropy of Major League Baseball Umpires. I'm reaching out about an incredible scholarship opportunity for youth adopted late in life through our All-Star College Scholarship Program. This scholarship offers **\$10,000 per year** for four years, and on top of funding each student is paired with a Major League umpire as part of their mentorship team to help them succeed in school and beyond! The UMPS CARE Charities All-Star College Scholarship is for youth adopted **at or after the age of 13**. Family Engagement Center: COVID Information

Greetings Resource Parents. With multiple changes occurring over the past couple years, and some modest confusion, I am providing an update on current FEC practices around COVID, expectations for Family Time (visits), etc.

1. <u>Protocol for entering the FEC</u>... In order to continue welcoming families into the FEC, the following Protocol is required of all:

Upon arrival:

- ✓ Remain socially distanced from others not in your party.
- ✓ Wear face coverings (masks) if you or anyone in your party is vulnerable or others in your party wish for you to wear a face covering.
- ✓ Apply provided hand sanitizer before entering the building. Wash your hands if necessary.
- ✓ Check in at the front desk

During family-time:

- ✓ Stay in the room that you are assigned except to use the restroom or to utilize the kitchen/dining room space to eat. Staff will assist as needed.
- ✓ Utilize hand sanitizer and/or wash your hands as often as needed.
- ✓ Be respectful and courteous to the building, materials, all other visitors, and FEC staff.
- \checkmark Love your children we know they missed you and that you missed them but be sure to allow them space.
- ✓ Food is available Food and drinks are not allowed outside of the dining room.

When family-time is over:

- ✓ Clean up after your child and yourself
- ✓ End you family time session with grace and love-End on a positive and up-beat mood so that your child will have an amazing rest of their day.
- 2. **Self-Screening**: All persons are asked to self-screen for the following for anyone in the household prior to the start of a visit at the FEC (each time):
 - Do you or anyone in the home currently or have recently had COVID?
 - Do you or anyone in the home currently have (or recently had) a fever of 100.4+?
 - Are you or anyone in the home awaiting the results of a COVID test?
 - Do you or anyone in the home currently have (or recently had) any of the following:
 - o Chills, Cough, Sore Throat, Sneezing, Nausea, Diarrhea, Vomiting, Runny Nose, Shortness of Breath, Loss of Taste/Smell, Body/Head Aches, Congestion.

Admitting to any of the above may not require you to miss a visit with your child. That determination will be made upon further discussion.

3. Current visitation expectations:

- All families deserve visitation in the least restrictive and most inviting and engaging setting possible. When visits must occur at the FEC, the expectation is that families visit as often as possible to ensure ongoing relationship building, bonding, and engagement. For some kiddos, that might mean every day and for others it can be once or twice per week. It is our hope that all parties can agree to do what the child and family need. With that, all families are being provided visits at least once per week at the FEC. We aim for a minimum of two currently and more if needed. We appreciate the care providers assistance with transportation whenever possible (this is the best scenario for kiddos).
- Relatives... if a relative is residing with the visiting parent, he/she (with the caseworker's approval) are allowed to attend visits. All other relative visits are decided on a case-by-case basis.
- Sibling visits continue to be approved on a case-by-case basis to occur at the FEC. Depending on staffing levels we typically require one of the children's care providers to stay with the children for their sibling visits.
- Food: mealtime, snacks, and food in general is a pretty important aspect to family time at the FEC. Most families enjoy sharing a meal together and this is encouraged. While healthy options are best, that is not often what our families are focused on and we allow them to bring what they can for their kiddos. If children have developed food aversions or medically recommended changes to their diets, please talk with the assigned engager and we will support that to the best of our ability.

FAQ - Educational Quick Facts re. Youth in Foster Care

INCLUDING important WCHSA policy updates!!

(Updated 9/30/21)

Did you know??

- SCHOOL OF ATTENDANCE: Foster youth have the right to remain at their School of Origin (see definition at end of document) when they come into care and/or change placements - even if it's an adoptive placement - to reduce additional disruptions and maintain their educational stability.
 - o WHY?
 - Often the school they attend when they come into care is the "only" stable environment in their world - while parents and placements are in flux.
 - Statistically, foster youth lose an average of 6 months of education for every school move/disruption.
 - WCHSA is bound by State and National legislation, to ensure that every effort is made to maintain our foster youth in their School of Origin.
 - IF it is determined to be in the best interest of the student to change schools, it MUST be approved by WCHSA leadership. This process is coordinated through the student's worker and the WCHSA educational liaison.
 - Foster Parents, relatives and fictive kid CANNOT change a youth's school without proper approval
- TRANSPORTATION: Mileage reimbursement is available to whomever is assisting with transportation if there is no bus available. This applies to "anyone" transporting the youth, while the case is open.
 - The district tracks the miles, so you don't have to! The reimbursement is one round trip, based on mapped miles between school and placement address and is disbursed once a month (electronic payments are available!) for the prior month of transport.
- STRONG COMMUNICATION IS KEY
 - The relationship with your student's school is your first line of defense in providing support.
 - Communicate with your worker when things get confusing or challenging.

INFINITE CAMPUS: Get acquainted with Infinite Campus to follow student progress - provide kudos earned and track missing assignments. "It takes a village" and caregivers are an essential part of that village!

Meet your Adoption Subsidy specialists:

Mary Encarnacion and Erika Meszaros, please reach out to us by e-mail or phone so that we can help you with any of your post-adoption needs.

Reasons you would contact your adoption subsidy worker after the adoption finalizes:

- · Navigating mental health supports for your adopted child.
- Medicaid is not working
- Adoption Subsidy Payment is not received
- Change in banking account, update direct deposit
- Moving out of state:

Please contact WCHSA as soon as you know. However, information cannot be switched until we have an address in the new state you are relocating.

• Divorce:

The Adoption Subsidy benefit must be identified in the Divorce, and it must go to one parent specifically. WCHSA will need a copy of the divorce decree and order identifying the parent who will receive the adoption subsidy. (Bank needs to be updated, direct deposit form)

Deceased parent:

WCHSA will need a copy of the death certificate to put in the file so that the check can be issued to the surviving spouse.

If your child was adopted at 13:
 Information about benefits that child may be eligible for in college.


